

Good Afternoon. My name is Patrice Cuddy and I am the director of Child Parent Programs at Westchester Jewish Community Services.

Thank you to the Early Childhood Advisory Council for this opportunity to speak today about improving the quality and access to New York's early childhood care and education programs and for the work you do to improve the lives of New York's children.

As an early childhood educator for more than 20 years, I have studied the research that clearly demonstrates the components of a high quality early childhood care and education program; and I have witnessed the positive impact of these programs on our most vulnerable - and often most promising children— those from families with multiple barriers to educational and economic success — including poverty and other forms of disadvantage, including, but not limited to immigration, language barriers and systemic racism.

We know what quality looks like. That is why I am here today to advocate for the Parent Child Home Program to be a strong part of the legislative agenda of the ECAC. The Parent Child Home Program is nationally recognized, evidence-based, intensive, two-year home-visiting program that is a worthy investment of taxpayer dollars. Families enroll in the program when their child is approximately two years old and receive twice weekly, 30 minute visits from a highly trained home visitor for 23 weeks a year for a total of 92 home



visits over a two-year period. The home visitor employs a non-directive approach, utilizing high quality games and books that are left in the home, to model behavior for parents and enhance child development. Decades

of longitudinal studies and positive outcomes clearly demonstrates that the Parent Child Home Program is of the highest quality and it works – it works in preparing young children for success in school and in life. The issue is Access. Lack of access of low-income families and children to high quality early childhood programs. Access to high quality early care and education programs that break the school preparation gap and academic achievement gap between children from low-income families and their more economically advantaged peers. Access to the financial resources that provide economically advantaged families with greater access to high quality programs for their pre-school children. The national studies are too numerous to mention but they clearly show the efficacy of the Parent Child Home Program:

- School Readiness: PCHP graduates enter Kindergarten prepared to learn and achieve over the longterm at considerably higher rates than control group participants.
- Health Child Development: PCHP graduates show increased independence, social cooperation,
 cognitive abilities, emotional stability, task orientation and pre-literacy.
- Strengthens Families the PCHP promotes positive parenting skills, increases healthy interactions and communication between parents and children, and parents increased consistency and responsiveness and affection to their children.



- Empowered Parents the PCHP provided parents with opportunities to develop skills and knowledge to be confident in their abilities to be their child's first and most important teacher. PCHP families show greater involvement with their child's school and education.
- Return on Investment the PCHP yields short and long-term economic benefits and saving.
 - > Studies show reduced need for costly special education services resulting from home visiting programs demonstrate reductions in the number of children entering school with developmental delay and show significant increase in a a participant's lifetime earnings potential.

WJCS has administered the Parent Child Home Program in Westchester for 45 years and we are proud to be the only replication of the national program in Westchester. The WJCS Parent Child Home Program is the anchor to our agency's early childhood programs — we have expanded the reach and impact through other innovations based on the PCHP model including the WJCS Child Care Home Program, the Parent-Child Center, Early Childhood Matters and Summer Fun at Hartley Park.

Over the past four years, Westchester families and children have been the beneficiaries of New York State funding that has allowed the WJCS Parent Child Home Program to solidify and expand services. The Public-Private Partnership grant through OCFS, expiring next year, has leveraged private funding and has helped WJCS provide access to the highest quality early care and education services in Mt. Vernon. Please make every effort to advocate for the continuation of OCFS Public-Private Partnership funding in Mt. Vernon and



other Westchester and NY State communities and for additional NY Stare funding for home visiting services that break the school preparation gap and cycle of poverty and disadvantage.

In closing, I am grateful for the opportunity to advocate for home visiting services for all NY State children who deserve access to the highest quality early care and education. I am also grateful for the chance to give voice

to children and families in local communities in Westchester, who are often forgotten among the known wealth and advantage of this county. Please make all these children and families part of your legislative agenda.
